Racing Begins for our 70th Year

2023 marks the 70th season of sailboat racing at Portage Lake, Pinckney Michigan.

Portage Yacht Club (PYC) is one of the oldest sailing clubs in the state of Michigan. We have a proud tradition of competitive excellence in Michigan as well as Nationally. PYC members have won National and North American championships in several classes as well as prestigious US Sailing national championships. Besides this serious stuff, we have a lot of FUN and camaraderie.

Racing began for the Gold Series on Saturday May 21, and for the Silver Series on Thursday May 25.

The Silver Series now features both Lasers and multihanded boats racing on the same course (but with different starts) and an exciting new reaching finish course configuration.



Eight Bells – Buddy Melges



An American sailing legend passed away on May 18. Harry C. (Buddy) Melges (1930-2023) was more than a sailing champion, he was a force of nature, nicknamed "The Wizard of Zenda" after his home town of Zenda, Wisconsin.

Consider his accomplishments:

- Olympics: 1964 Bronze Medal in the Flying Dutchman, 1972 Gold Medal in the Soling.
- Pan Am Games: 1968 Gold Medal in the Flying Dutchman
- America's Cup: 1992 Winner in America3.
- Star Class: 1978 and 1979 World Champion
- **5.5 Meter Class:** 1967, 1973, and 1983 World Champion.
- E Scow: Five-time National Champion
- Skeeter Ice Boat: Seven-time National Champion
- US Sailing Men's Championship: Three-peat 1959, 1960, and 1961.
- US Sailing Rolex Yachtsman-of-the-Year: Winner in three different decades: 1961, 1972, and 1983

At the age of 80, Buddy won the A-Scow Inland Yachting Association Championship.

Buddy is also the subject of the movie "The Wizard of Zenda". The trailer is HERE.

As Gary Jobson has said, "Buddy Melges, in my view, is one of the greatest sailors of our age, by far...l've sailed with all of the best names of the sport, and Buddy's a cut above." There is no higher praise.

The Ocean Race Heads For the Finish

Leg 5 of The Ocean Race kicked off on Sunday May 21, as the fleet departed Newport, RI and headed to Aahus, Denmark.

Leg 4 from Itajaí, Brazil to Newport several heartstopping moments:

 Two boats were dismasted, including series leader Holcim PRB. The other boat, GUYOT Environnment Team Europe was forced to motor to Halifax, Nova Scotia and is being transported to Europe in an attempt to rejoin the race there.

- 11th Hour Racing (USA), managed to win the leg to their home port of Newport, their first leg victory.
- 11th Hour Racing's victory, coupled with the dismasting of Holcim PRB, means that the top three boats: Holcim PRB, 11th Hour Racing, and Team Malizia were in a virtual tie heading into the trans-Atlantic Leg 5, which scores double points.
- Holcim PRB arrived via ship in Newport on Wednesday 17-Jun, a mere three days before the in-port race and four days before the start of Leg 5. Their new mast was on hand and they managed to start Leg 5.

Leg 5 offered even more drama. The top three boats each broke 24-hour distance records with Team Malizia ultimately claiming the top award with 641 nautical miles in a single day.

Biotherm broke a shroud and is limping toward Aahus and the start of Leg 6.

11th Hour Racing struck a large marine animal that injured two of their crew, but still managed to make it from Newport to Aarhus in a little more than seven days, followed closely by Holcim PRB and Team Malizia to round out the podium.

Each team is mixed gender and also has an onboard reporter and media specialist. There are stunning videos and drone footage each day.

11th Hour Racing held off challenges by both Holcim PRB and Team Malizia in Leg 6 from Aarhus to The Hague. Leg 6 started on Thursday June 8, and concluded less than four days later, even including a



trip down the east side of the Danish penninsula to Kiel, Germany before heading back around Denmark to the Dutch coast.

With the victory in Leg 6, Charley Enright and the American team (which also includes frenchman Frank Cammas and british navigator Simon Fisher) hold a two point lead with one leg to go:

The final 2,185 mile leg from The Hague through the Straits of Gibraltar to Genoa, Italy starts on June 15. The winning boat gets five points, the second place boat gets four, etc.. If 11th Hour Racing finishes third or better, they will win the event since the tiebreaking is based upon their in-port races where they have a commanding lead over Holcim PRB.



The final leg includes the additional challenge of sailing through an area off Spain and Portugal and near Gibraltar where several smaller sailboats have been attacked and damage by orca (*Ed: the plural of orca is also orca*). Eight Bells – Terry Kilpatrick



The former owner of Customflex, Terry Kilpatrick, passed away on May 25. Terry worked at Customflex building Interlakes, Flying Scots, Comets, Penguins, and Crescents before taking over the company upon the retirement of its founder,

Vince DiMaio. Customflex also built Highlanders for a period.

Throughout his tenure with Customflex, Terry was a stalwart supporter of the Interlake and Interlake sailors, even serving as the Class President when Customflex was no longer the Class Builder. Terry is survived by his wife Karen, children, and grandchildren.

There was a Celebration of Life on June 11, 2023 from in Toledo. The Interlake Class is formulating plans for suitable rememberance of Terry.

Small Boat Atlantic Record Remains Intact



The record for the smallest boat to sail across the Atlantic remains at 1.6 meters (about 7 ft). Andrew Bedwell (GBR) was forced to abandon his attempt to perform this feat with a boat less than 4 ft long ended in Newfoundland mere hours after it began when his Big C Atlantic Challenge began taking on water and he was forced to return to his point of origin. The boat was so full of water that hoisting it back to dry land damaged it further.



There are small boats, such as we sail at PYC, and there are SMALL boats!

Thankfully, Mr Bedwell was unharmed.
