### 37th America's Cup in Barcelona

The Louis Vuitton Cup fulfilled its mission of providing a competition to advance the best challenger to the 37th America's Cup. INEOS Britannia was most certainly not the best when the series began August 29, but the British team proved to be for their final race on October 4. While the devil is in the details, which is hard to detect with the hyper-tech AC75 yacht, the British squeezed more out of their boat than the others. The French were first to go, then the Swiss were no match, and the USA couldn't get it together. As for the Italians, they plateaued while the Brits continued their climb.



Aside from it being 60 years since Great Britain had a yacht compete in the America's Cup Match, INEOS Britannia is not

going to cheat the viewer when they face the Kiwi defender. While the AC75 yacht may not be everyone's cup of tea, the Brits aren't afraid to match race, and the America's Cup is a match racing event.

The Italians were plenty good in the Louis Vuitton Finals, but the Brits remembered match racing mattered. While Italy was likely to play the course and wind shifts, the Brits were as likely to play their opponent. Passing is hard after the start, and British skipper Ben Ainslie made it harder. Watching punches thrown and landed is entertaining. Ainslie was the 2010 Match Racing World Champion, and his team was the most aggressive and inventive before the gun. When they mastered what moves were possible, and improved their allaround speed, they were too much for Italy. Will they be too much for New Zealand? The 37th Match (best of 13 series) is October 12-27.

# US Sailing Adult Championship at DYC

The 2024 U.S. Adult Sailing Championship at Detroit Yacht Club was a thrilling display of skill and strategy. The regatta featured a competitive fleet, with sailors from across the

country showcasing their talents in various conditions. Over several days of racing, participants demonstrated excellent teamwork and boat handling. Paul Lee, who won PYC's Hot Scot Regatta three weeks previously, represented the host Detroit Yacht Club and finished fifth.

The first day of racing was canceled due to heavy winds from Hurricane Helene's outer bands, leaving teams just two packed days of racing to fight for the title.

The event saw a mix of seasoned veterans and emerging talent, all vying for the top spot. Close finishes and tactical duels were a common sight, keeping spectators on the edge of their seats. The regatta completed ten races throughout the weekend.

On the regatta overall, Jeff added, "Great event! Great qualifying series with top-notch sailors. We love that they change classes year-to-year to give sailors the chances to try different classes."

# 2024 Championship of Champions

The 2024 Championship of Champions brought together an exceptional group of sailors for a weekend of intense racing at the Grand Maumelle Sailing Club. Taking place from October 3-6 on the scenic waters of Lake Maumelle in Roland, Arkansas, this year's event showcased top talent from across the nation, with competitors sailing in Y-Flyers—a class known for its speed, agility, and the tactical demands it places on both helm and crew. One of US Sailing's most prestigious events, the C-of-C delivered thrilling competition, with close races, sharp maneuvers, and a dramatic conclusion. The Interlake Class was represented by Stuart and Matt Fisher of Hoover Sailing Club, who finished sixth behind the winning Lightning Class representatives, David Starck & Jenna Probst.



Robert & Nina Cummings from the Flying Scot Class finished 13<sup>th</sup> in the 20boat fleet. Lake Maumelle provided a challenging

#### Sailing Heroes



Can you name this sailing hero?

This person was the son of a sailing canoe enthusiast and an avid disciple of the British racer and designer Uffa Fox.

At a young age, he learned to race sailing canoes and ice boats. After graduating from Dartmouth College in 1926 he met the legendary Uffa Fox at a regatta. He described his admiration for Fox in an article written in 1933, "I have no hesitation in naming him my most unforgettable character: boat designer, racing skipper, writer, wit, raconteur, singer and friend." He was also a good athlete which helped his sailing.

During the Depression years he started a boat building company that made sailing canoes, International 14s (an Uffa Fox creation), Stars, and Interlakes. After the war ended, he designed a new 17- foot open cockpit planing dinghy and named it the Thistle. He was proud of his Scottish heritage and named his subsequent one designs the Highlander (1949) and the Flying Scot (1958). During the early years of his boat building he shifted from wood to (then new) fiberglass and pioneered advances in construction techniques in the process. The Thistle, Highlander, and Flying Scot have stood the test of time and are actively raced throughout North America. His concept was to create affordable, small one designs to be raced by families.

To help build up the classes, he raced regularly and was often at the front of the fleet. His racing was impressive and included winning the Thistle National Championship five times, the Flying Scot North American Championship seven times and the North American International Ten Meter Sailing Canoe Championship five times. His wife Mary (1907-2005) was a regular crew for over 30 years. Writing about the Thistle, he noted, "Thistle would be light and graceful – how she would slip along in the lightest airs leaving hardly a ripple on the water, sailing right through the entire fleet." You can just imagine how he got his boat rolling in light wind and found a way to take the lead. He is Sandy Douglass (1904-1992)
